

Livestock Tagging

If you plan on showing market livestock at the fair all animals will need to be weighed in and tagged. Ownership of all animals including breeding and dairy is as follows:

June 1st- Bucket calves, horses and poultry 90 days – Sheep, Swine, beef heifers, and goats 120 Days – Market Beef

All 4-H members should be enrolled in their projects before weigh-in. If you need help adding projects call the Extension Office. Weigh-ins will be at the following locations and times:

Spring Weigh-In Dates

Market Beef Weigh--In: March 24 in Sedan. 120 days prior to fair.

Market Hog/Lamb/Meat Goats Weigh-In: April 26-27 in Sedan. 89-88 days before the fair.



Drop/Add Project Deadline

You have until **May 1** to make changes in your projects. You can do this through 4-H Online or call the extension Office and we can do it for you. If you are trying to do this in 4-H Online, after May 1 it will not allow you to make any changes.




What to bring: SD Memory Card, Lunch, Creativity!

Getting a Jump Start on a Career

4-H can help youth gain experience and knowledge from projects that spin off into a career. Several 4-H'ers have bred and own their own animals, but some have gone a step farther and produce animals to sell to others. Chautauqua County has four 4-H'ers that are Junior Producers.

Levi Goode has been in 4-H for 8 years. He is a Freshman at Sedan High School. Levi started raising and selling his cattle about 7 years ago and sells predominantly to ranchers in Kansas and Oklahoma. He says growing up on a ranch prompted him to take this route; Levi is a fifty generation rancher. Levi enjoys showing cattle, breaking colts, working on the ranch and baseball. His favorite 4-H projects are, of course, Beef and Horse. Levi has several accomplishments so far including breeding, raising and showing his own show cattle, breaking and training a colt with only verbal guidance, and placing in the Kansas Beef Expo Judging Contest a few years ago.

Payton Carter is a member of Prairie Pride 4-H for 7 years. She's in 8th grade at Sedan. She likes sports, hanging out with her friends, and 4-H. Payton feels that her greatest accomplishment, so far, is winning the Round Robin. For the last three years, Payton has sold sheep to other 4-H'ers in Chautauqua Coun-ty to give them the opportunity to show sheep. Pay-ton advises anyone in 4-H to try showing any animal you like.

Kaden and Willow McCoy raise hogs and sell them "all over". They've sold hogs in Texas, California, Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Nebraska. Kaden started his business to raise his own hogs and to make a little money, too. Willow quickly followed suite.

Kaden is in the 8th grade at Sedan and has been in 4-H 8 years. When he's not working with his hogs, Kaden likes fishing, hunting, basketball, track and baseball. He feels his greatest accomplishment has been winning the Round Robin. His favorite 4-H project? You guessed it, showing pigs.

This is Willow's second year in 4-H. Last year, her first year in 4-H, she got to be in the Round Robin competition. She considers that a great accomplishment. Her favorite projects are pigs and lambs, but she also likes just being with friends. Willow encourages everyone to try showing pigs.

YQCA Requirement

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national, multispecies youth livestock quality assurance program that focuses on food safety, animal well-being, and character development through age-appropriate educational curriculum for I youth 7-21 years of age. This program is an annual certification that grows with a young person, so the learning modules are different every year. ALL exhibitors, including youth who will be showing market animals, commercial breeding I females, and/or registered purebred breeding females at the Kansas State Fair Grand Drive and Kansas Junior Livestock Show (KJLS), will need to be YQCA certified prior to nominating animals for State shows. Your certification from any I previous year does not carry over to this year. A new certification must occur each year.

Youth may obtain their YQCA certification using one of the following methods: Instructor-led

Training or the Online Course. There will also be two face-to-face YQCA training opportunities in the Rolling Prairie District.

*Howard training will be on Tuesday, March 19th at 6:30 pm

*Sedan training will be on Wednesday, April 24th at 7:00 pm.

Chautauqua County Club Day and Favorite Foods Show

Saturday, February 24, was Club Day and Favorite Foods Show in Chautauqua County. The Favorite Foods Show is an exhibit and contest to encourage 4-H members to learn about meal planning, food preparation and presentation. A "Favorite Food" is chosen, one the 4-H'er likes and likes to prepare. A menu is planned with the food and the table decor is coordinated. Foods chosen maybe main courses, desserts, snacks, breads, casseroles or other. Three 4-H'ers participated in the Favorite Foods Show. Adalyn Leonard placed 1st in the Senior Division. In the Junior Division, June Gooden placed first and Atleigh Rainbolt placed second.

Four 4-H'ers participated in the Talks and Demonstrations division. Wyatt Schmidtberger of Sedan Willing Workers and Tiffany McDaniel of the Prairie Pride club both received top blues and are eligible to participate in Regional 4-H Day in Madison. Lakyn Sutton received a blue ribbon for her talk and Colton Ferencik received a red.

In the Talent Division, June Gooden of Sedan Willing Workers received a Top Blue for her piano solo. Prairie Pride and Sedan Willing Workers 4-H Clubs each performed a skit and both clubs received top blue ribbons. They are also eligible for Regionals in Madison on March 23rd.



Rock Springs Rocks!

4-H Camp at Rock Springs is right around the corner. Registration for Summer 2024 sessions is open. The goal of Rock Springs Ranch is to teach the positive youth development of Kansas 4-H and introduce our Centers of Excellence in Leader-ship, Conservation and Sportsmanship. Below you will find the various camp experiences you will find at Rock Springs Ranch. Traditional 4-H Camp

Explorers—Ages 8-10 (rising 3rd - 5th graders)
The youngest campers will work on gaining their independence, making new friends and discovering the larger world around them. At camp, they will experience archery, BBs, swimming, intro to horses, corcles, the giant swing and much more.

Trailblazers—Ages 11-13 (rising 6th-8th graders)
This group has greater access to activities and will spend time with more campers in their age group working on skills development. Activities specific to this age group include 3D archery, swimming, horses, rifles, ca-noes, climbing wall, stream study and more.

Adventurers—Ages 14-17 (rising high schoolers)
This is the oldest group in the "traditional" camp. Adventurers spend most of their time at activities they choose, making friendships that will last a lifetime.
Activities are at the top tier of 4-H camp at RSR. Offer -ings include aerial archery, swimming, horses, trap shooting, kayaks, high ropes and zipline.

Teen Leadership Camp

Leaders in Training (LIT) - rising 10th and 11th graders

LIT focuses on leadership and community development programming along with a service project.

There will also be time to just relax, make new friends and enjoy other camp activities. This is an excellent progression if a camper thinks they may want to learn skills that go beyond camp, advance to Counselors in Training or join RSR staff in the future.

Counselors in Training (CIT) - rising 12th graders
CIT is a hands-on progression that develops the leadership abilities to help teens on the path from camper to counselor. Throughout the week, they will receive camper care training and counselor experience
while improving their leadership skills and being
mentored by youth develop-ment staff. They will also
enjoy "camp" time with peers built into each day.

Scholarship Hints & Tips

Did you know there are over 50 different 4-H scholar-ships available in the State of Kansas? Those scholar-ships are due March 1 of each year. However, Chautauqua County also has 4-H Scholarships that you can apply for and the deadline for it is April 1st.. The Chautauqua County 4-H Scholarship is set up to reward 4-H'ers who have excelled in the Chautauqua

County 4-H program through their leadership, citizenship, and project skills.

In order to qualify for this scholarship, there are some things that you have to do, but they can be done any-time during your 4-H career.

- Complete and submit your record book each year.
- Take part in County 4-H Day as a contestant presenting an individual number.
- Participate in at least one out-of-county judging,
 4-H Workshop or approved event or contest.
- Serve as a junior leader at a county 4-H Event (County Fair, Club Day, Etc.)

- Serve as a club officer.
- ♦ Serve as a chairperson of a 4-H Club Committee.
- Receive County recognition at the County Achievement Banquet.

In the year you apply, you need to do the following:

- 1) Exhibit one or more projects at the county fair.
- 2) Present part of the program for at least one regularly scheduled meeting (Demonstration, project talk, illustrated talk, etc.)
- 3) Complete and submit your 4-H Record Book.
- Write a story about your ambitions and how 4-H has helped you.
 - 5) Interview with the Scholarship Committee to tell about your interests, aspirations and experiences. It's usually pretty easy to talk about the things you like.

That's basically it. We all like to receive money for doing a job well done. It's even

better if it helps us get into a career that we enjoy.

Those experiences help you to tell about your time in

4-H and how those experiences have prepared you
for the next step in your life.

If you are looking at continuing your education after high school, or even if it's not yet on your radar, do the basics. It's always good to have options.
